Doing the Impossible Aug 30 2022 Apollo was known for its engineering triumphs, but its success also came from a disciplined management style. Mueller, the system manager of the human spaceflight program of the 1960s, applied the SPO methodology and other special considerations such as "all-up" testing, resulting in the success of the Apollo Program.
